A couple of decades ago, all I knew about Pendleton were the early morning times that I transferred from one Greyhound bus to another. Today, the community is one of my favorite places to visit museums and experience heritage.

The Oregon Museums Association and the Oregon Heritage Commission, along with Pendleton-area organizations, will offer you plenty of opportunities to learn about the area's museums and heritage during the Oregon Heritage Conference May 3-5. The OMA is having its spring meeting as part of the conference. Museums around the state are eligible for a discount registration rate.

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"We believe that Pendleton can provide a more-than-you-expected conference for you," says Pendleton Chamber of Commerce director Leslie Carnes. "Pendleton is truly unique in the number of quality, unusual attractions and culturally relevant heritage sites packed so conveniently close together."

CHAMPOEG FRIENDS GET NEW DIRECTOR, AWARD

GILL STARTS AS COORDINATOR OF HISTORIC CEMETERIES

Kuri Gill has started work as the Historic Cemeteries Program Coordinator with the Heritage Programs Division of Oregon Parks and Recreation Department. She is looking forward to working with the Oregon Commission on Historic Cemeteries, ORPD staff and the public to preserve and enhance Oregon*s historic cemeteries.

Gill grew up in Oregon, traveling in and around the state. She is familiar with regional history and credits her early travels with her interest in heritage preservation. She holds a Masters Degree in Museum Studies from California State University, Chico. She began her Oregon museum career at Linn County Historical Museum, in Brownsville. For the last six years, she served as Curator and Education Coordinator at Mission Mill Museum in Salem where she gained experience in building and structure preservation.

She hopes to create an immediate and long range plan for the program including continuing to document historic cemeteries and to provide useful, quality resources for those who are preserving, interpreting and promoting historic cemeteries. YAMHILL COUNTY MUSEUM HIRES FIRST DIRECTOR

During its February meeting, the Yamhill County Historical Society Board of Directors took a huge step forward when they voted to hire Katherine Huit as their first staff member. Hiring Huit as Executive Director is a major milestone for the fifty year old organization, which has been managed by volunteers since 1957.

As a life-long resident of Yamhill County, a professional historian, and a leader in Oregon's museum community, Huit has much to offer the organization as it embarks on a new chapter and a capital campaign for building a new museum complex. Recently gifted with 12 acres of land at the corner of Highway 18 and Durham Lane near McMinnville, the Yamhill County Museum enlisted the services of Don Statsny of StatsnyBrun Architects, Inc. to design the concept for its new museum complex. Plans are to break ground on the new complex this spring, beginning with the expansion of a storage building, and the construction of a 40,000 square foot agriculture building

Huit, who holds a Masters Degree in American History, comes to the museum after working for nearly eight years at the Evergreen Aviation Museum. Her accomplishments while at Evergreen include managing the permanent collection, coordinating exhibits design and installation, and starting the museum's oral history program. She also wrote and produced *Dream to Fly: Howard Hughes and the Flying Boat*, narrated by Walter Cronkite, and helped bring in cash donations to offset the costs of preservation work and exhibits. Huit also serves as the editor of the OMA *Dispatch*.

Resources and Training

HERITAGE CONFERENCE WORKSHOP HIGHLIGHTS

Two full-day and one half-day workshops are among the activities scheduled at the 2007 Oregon Heritage Conference. Highlights include:

A full-day oral history workshop, presented by the Northwest Oral History Association, will be presented May 3. The workshop is designed for those starting in oral history or brushing-up your skills. You will learn about oral history project planning, research, equipment, interviewing techniques, and legal and ethical considerations.

The half-day archives management workshop will be presented May 3 by the Oregon State Historic Records Advisory Board. Records advisory board members who are expert in archives techniques and management will conduct these workshops. The workshop is a basic overview of archival best practice, focusing on setting up and maintaining institutional archives.

The Oregon Commission on Historic Cemeteries will present a full-day workshop May 5 on cemetery care and management. The Cemetery Preservation Basics Workshop will be geared towards people or groups that want to know the basics about how to plan and care for historic grave markers. The sessions, some of which will take place in a historic cemetery, will include surveying objects, planning for repair work, identifying and cleaning various types of headstones, and basic repair.

POTTER SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE

Application forms for the 2007 Elisabeth Walton Potter Historic Preservation Advocacy & Education Awards are available. These awards provide funding for individuals to aid them in meeting their travel expenses to a conference or workshop that will help them in moving forward historic preservation advocacy and/or education efforts in their local community.

A total of \$7,500 is slated to be shared among award recipients. The Oregon SHPO is encouraging applications from all across Oregon. Individuals can nominate themselves or be nominated by another person. Completed applications are due no later than April 20; award recipients will be announced during National Historic Preservation Month in May. CENTURY FARM, RANCH APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE

The Oregon Century Farm & Century Ranch Program, a statewide recognition program honoring farmers and ranchers who have worked the same land for at least 100 years, is taking applications for its 2007 recognition. The program administered through the Oregon Agricultural Education Foundation has honored more than 1,000 farms and ranches across the state with the designation. Oregon has one of the oldest agricultural heritage programs of this type in the entire nation.

Successful applicants receive a certificate signed by the governor. A durable metal road sign to identify their property as having historic Century Farm or Century Ranch status is also available. Additionally, each family is honored during a special ceremony and reception at the Oregon State Fair. A formal application process is required for properties to be considered for the program. The deadline to apply for Century Farm & Ranch status is June 1.

Just outside of town, the 10-year-old Tamastslikt Cultural Institute has already established itself as a cultural leader for the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation, and for the region and state.

And, of course, Pendleton is home to art galleries, live theater, and a symphony - all in a town of about 17,000 people. The OMA program committee and the Heritage Commission have sought to put together a program of interest to museums and heritage programs across the state. Grant writing, marketing, technology, funding issues and education are some of the topics that will be covered during the conference sessions. Tours are being planned, as are workshops in archives management, oral history and cemetery care.

OREGON'S SESQUICENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS

On March 13, 2007, Governor Ted Kulongoski officially launched preparations for the 150th anniversary of Oregon's admittance into the Union. The nonprofit Oregon 150 will plan the 2009 celebration to appreciate the past, celebrate the present, and imagine the future. The celebration will begin February 14, 2009 and last through the fall of 2009.

"In 2009, Oregon will celebrate 150 years of statehood. The sesquicentennial will be a unique opportunity to honor our past and all of the people who created the quilt of natural beauty, urban and rural communities, diverse economy, and original thinking that we call Oregon," the Governor said. "But just as important, our 150th birthday is a chance to look forward and share with each other our hopes and dreams for Oregon's future."

To prepare for Oregon's 150th birthday, the Governor created Oregon 150, a nonprofit organization. Motivated citizens from across the state serve as its Board of Directors. The goal of this volunteer Board is to inspire people across the state to remember, experience, and celebrate Oregon and, together, create a robust and sustainable future.

"This milestone birthday celebration should encourage Oregonians to explore the fascinating history and rich bounty that makes our state so special," said Barbara Sidway of Baker City, newly elected President and Chair of Oregon 150.

The Board's mission statement is supported by a strong set of values, including ensuring that Oregonians across the state of every age, income, and ethnic background participate in the sesquicentennial, and that the sesquicentennial will contribute to the welfare of Oregon through sustainable legacies in our communities.

"Although the Oregon 150 Board will help guide critical program and funding decisions for our 2009 sesquicentennial, my vision is for community organizations, schools, town and tribal governments, and individual citizens on the local level to come up with ideas and plan celebrations that fit their needs," said Governor Kulongoski. "Oregon's 150th birthday should reflect the rich diversity and history that has shaped who we are today."
