Repatriation and restitution

Benin celebrates the return of its looted treasures

Priceless treasures stolen by the French army over a century ago have finally been returned to the African nation.

"At first glance, it seems to be just another day in Cotonou, Benin's largest city. Motorbike-taxis are everywhere, filling the streets of the country's economic capital with dust and noise. But inside the swanky presidential palace, something seismic is taking place: over a century after they were looted by the French army, 26 treasures that once belonged to the nation have gone on display to the public."

Repatriating ancestral remains to Hawaii

"A delegation representing the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) repatriated a total of 58 *iwi kūpuna* (ancestral Hawaiian skeletal remains) from four institutions in Germany and one in Austria that were stolen over 100 years ago from Hawai'i.

The repatriation of the *iwi kūpuna* is the culmination of many years of research, coordination and communications between OHA and European museum, anthropologic and academic institutions. These *iwi kūpuna* were collected from Kaua'i, Moloka'i, Maui and Hawai'i Island during a time of colonial violence, and were horrendously dehumanized for study without the consent of their families. The return of the *iwi kūpuna* to their one *hānau* (homeland) allows for healing and restoration of dignity, so they may finally rest peacefully."

New guidance available for return and restitution of items from university museums and collections

University museums should reconsider holding items that were acquired illegally or unethically, according to new guidance from the [International Council of Museum's](#) committee for university museums and collections.

The "[Guidance for Restitution and Return of Items from University Museums and Collections](#)" is intended to inform and support universities regarding requests for the return of items from their museums and collections. The document emphasizes the need to involve other stakeholders and says the guidance is not intended to supplant laws or other formal frameworks that may be in place.

Oregon Black Pioneers offers K-12 lesson plans

All are designed to align with state social studies and ethnic studies curriculum standards, and were made using materials from OBP's research collections.

National Snapshot of COVID-19 Impact on United States Museums

American Alliance of Museums began a survey in June 2020 to assess the overall impact of COVID-19 on museums' financial condition. Over 700 museum directors responded to the survey on behalf of their organizations, representing a broad cross-section of the field in geography, size, and discipline. Some of the findings from the survey fielded December 8, 2021-January 20, 2022 include:

- Since March 2020, on average, museums were closed to the public for 28 weeks due to the pandemic.
- In April of 2021, only 44% of museums had reported that they did not furlough or lay off any staff since the start of the pandemic. As of this survey, nearly three-quarters (73%) of responding museums report that they have been able to retain or restore all of their staff.
- Over the past two years, museums also reached out in new ways to support needs in their communities. 39% of respondents intend to maintain facilities or programs they created to support online learning or schooling based in the museum, and 18% intend to maintain initiatives such as food banks or wellness programs, they created to meet other community needs.
