Applications open for Oregon Heritage MentorCorps assistance

The Oregon Heritage MentorCorps is a trained group of volunteers with professional experience in collections care, emergency management, non-profit management, and other skills and abilities associated with heritage preservation efforts. Mentors help museums and heritage organizations get the guidance, training, and tools they need to help them with their heritage preservation activities.

Those requesting mentor assistance will be matched with a mentor based on factors such as geography and skills and abilities. Mentors are assigned to organizations for a period of 9-10 months and assistance may be in person, virtual, or by phone depending on distance and type of projects. **Applications are due August 19, 2022.**
